JULY 26TH – Rain Date: AUGUST 2

BATTLE FOR THE SEMINARY

This program will get underway at 6 PM. We will meet in the parking lot across from the Seminary Ridge Museum.

The program will offer an overview of the moments leading up to the collapse of the Union defenses at the dormitory of the Lutheran Seminary and cover the use of the dormitory to treat the wounded during the battle and its aftermath.



BENJAMIN NEELY has been part of the staff of the Adams County Historical Society since 2005 and the organization's Executive Director since 2012. Ben was the lead historian during the development of the Gettysburg Seminary Ridge Museum.

CAMP COLT

Paul Shevchuk will discuss Eisenhower's background prior to his command of Camp Colt, the layout of the Tank Corps camp, many of the structures that no longer exist using historic photographs, and an overall narrative of its nine-month existence. The importance of the Camp Colt experience to Eisenhower's future military career will also be examined. Please allow 1½ to 2 hours duration for the program.

This program will get underway at 6 PM. Park behind Pickett's Buffet along the west side of Johns Avenue. Car-pooling is suggested as space may be limited. Please bring water, insect repellent, and wear long sleeves and pants to deter ticks. Folding chairs are also welcome for those who need to sit as the tour will be stationary at times. The group will gather in the grassy area near the corner of Johns Avenue and Long Lane.

PAUL SHEVCHUK'S life-long interest in American history stemmed from his early years surrounded by the rich colonial and Revolutionary War history of the lowshere he obtained a Bachelor's degree in American History. In the spring of 1978, he accepted a position as a seasonal park ranger with the National Park Service at Gettysburg National Military Park. Two years later, he was selected as a permanent park ranger to staff the new Eisenhower National Historic Site. Over the next decade he served as a ranger-historian and interpreter at both parks. During this period he also authored six monographs on little-known cavalry engagements during the Battle of Gettysburg for the Gettysburg Magazine. He also wrote the introduction to a reprint of *A History of Company K, 1st Pennsylvania Reserves* by Thomas Publications. After 35 years of continuous service, including twenty-four years as a museum professional caring for the Park's famous Rosensteel Collection, he retired on January 3, 2014.



In his retirement, Paul continues to volunteer at the Eisenhower Farm with such events as the annual WW2 Weekend and USO Dance. Since 2012, he has been researching and writing a book on Eisenhower's experiences during the Great War, from his graduation at West Point in 1915 to his successful command of Camp Colt three years later. This work is ongoing.



Union surgeon James Dana Benton witnessed firsthand the suffering and death brought about by the ghastly wounds, infections, and diseases that wreaked havoc to both the Union and Confederate armies. A native of New York, Dr. Benton penned a series of letters throughout the war to his family relating

his experiences with the 111th New York Infantry as an assistant surgeon, and later with the 98th New York as surgeon. His unique correspondence, together with insights from author Chris Loperfido, coalesce to produce *Death and Disease in the Civil War: A Union Surgeon's Correspondence from Harpers Ferry to Richmond*.

Dr. Benton was present for some of the war's most gruesome and important battles, including Gettysburg, Cold Harbor, and the siege of Petersburg. He was also present at Harpers Ferry, Second Battle of Auburn, Battle of Morton's Ford, and Abraham Lincoln's Second Inaugural address. His pen offers an insightful and honest look into what everyday life was like for the surgeons who tirelessly worked to save the men who risked their lives for the preservation of the nation.



Loperfido's *Death and Disease in the Civil War* should be read by every student of the Civil War to better understand and come to grips with what awaited the wounded and the medical teams once the generals were finished with their work. 📖👤

Exploring Gettysburg this summer with Gettysburg National Military Park Service Rangers

Gettysburg National Military Park's free summer interpretive program series begins on June 9 and offers visitors a chance to learn about the people and places that made history during the Battle of Gettysburg. Hike the fields of Pickett's Charge, explore the rocky summit of Little Round Top, reflect on the words of the Gettysburg Address, and much more on these Ranger guided experiences. New offerings will appeal to first time and repeat visitors alike, such as:

Family History Hike (75 minutes) Perfect for families with children ages 4-13! Join a Park Ranger for an interactive hike across the battlefield. Plan for battle, learn how to march like a soldier, explore the farms on the battlefield and much more!

Lincoln Comes to Gettysburg: Downtown History Hike (75 minutes) Explore the impact of the battle upon the Gettysburg community, walk in the footsteps of President Lincoln, and visit the room where he completed the Gettysburg Address. This program begins and ends inside the Historic David Wills House Museum.

The David Wills House Museum Free during the summer of 2018! Explore the home of David and Catherine Wills, learn what it was like to be a civilian during the Battle of Gettysburg and visit the room where Abraham Lincoln finished writing the Gettysburg Address. Located in the center of Gettysburg at 8 Lincoln Square.

The Face of Battle: The Soldier Experience (1 hour) Over 160,000 soldiers participated in the Battle of Gettysburg. Discover the story of just one, follow in his footsteps across the battlefield, and learn why he fought and what he encountered at Gettysburg. Water, insect repellent, a hat, and proper foot gear are highly recommended.

America the Beautiful: Storybooks About our National Parks (1 hour) Join a Park Ranger for a reading adventure to one of our over 400 national park sites. Begin with an activity, followed after nightfall with a storybook reading by firelight. Recommended for families with children ages 4 to 11.
