IULY 25TH – RAIN DATE AUGUST 1 BATTLE OF THE PEACH ORCHARD

BG James Hessler will lead a battlefield tour on the attack and defense of Gettysburg's Peach Orchard. The Peach Orchard is one of the most underrated positions on the battlefield. The orchard's occupation by General

Sickles dictated General Meade's defense, while General Lee designated it as one of his July 2 objectives. The position's artillery value also significantly influenced Lee's decision to launch Pickett's Charge on July 3.

LBG Britt Isenberg is also tentatively scheduled to appear, and Jim & Britt will discuss many of the stories that are in-

cluded in their new book, Gettysburg's Peach Orchard.

JAMES HESSLER has been a Licensed Battlefield Guide at Gettysburg National Military Park since 2003.

Lee Civil War Round Table's "Bachelder Coddington Award" and the Gettysburg Civil War Roundtable's "Distinguished Book Award" as the most outstanding work on the Gettysburg Campaign.

His second book Pickett's Charge at Gettysburg (2015) was co-authored with Wayne Motts and is the first battlefield guide ever published on the famous July 3 assault. Jim's third book, co-authored with LBG Britt Isenberg, Gettysburg's Peach Orchard is available now.



Greetings to all...

m writing this on the morning after our tour of the cannon shop. We had a great turnout, at least sixty folks, by my count. Surely everyone appreciated Lucas Flickinger's

presentation. Speaking of which: One of the cool things about serving as Roundtable President is presenting the Certificate of Appreciation. These are truly handsome documents, prepared by Communication Directors Dave and Linda Joswick.

In May, Jeffrey D. Stoker's offered a vivid portrait of the 153rd Pennsylvania – particularly stunning in his account of gruesome, life-altering wounds suffered by the rank-and-file. As many

of these were received at what's remembered as Barlow's Knoll, it's worth remembering that Division Commander Francis Barlow had himself come to Gettysburg still not fully recovered from wounds to the face and groin at Antietam; then at the knoll that bears his name, the Harvard law grad was wounded yet again, this time left for dead. Francis Channing Barlow had more than done his duty, having every reason to go back to New York and resume his work on the legal staff of the New York Tribune. Instead, when Grant moved south in 1864, Barlow was newly returned to the army, leading the First Division in Winfield Hancock's Second Corps. For that matter, Oliver Otis Howard, who brought 11th Corps to Gettysburg, had lost an arm at Fair Oaks, thirteen months previous, but was back in September for Antietam, leading a brigade into the West Woods. The moral and physical resilience of these men surpasses understanding. Also in May, Hilda Koontz offered a "Show and Tell" on women's Civil War-era mourning attire, featuring a 150-year old black lace bonnet that would have been worn by a girl in "half-mourning." In our generations, Elisabeth Kubler-Ross has identified Five Stages of Grief, and it's interesting to think the Victorians literally wore their grief stages.
