

### "The Devil's to Pay": John Buford at Gettysburg

**M**r. Wittenberg's talk will focus on the actions of Buford's First Cavalry Division on July 1-2, 1863, based on his book of the same name. Although many books on Gettysburg have addressed the role played by Brig. Gen. John Buford and his First Cavalry Division troops, there is not a single book-length study devoted entirely to the critical delaying actions waged by Buford and his dismounted troopers and his horse artillery on the morning of July 1, 1863.

**E**ric J. Wittenberg is a native of southeastern Pennsylvania. He was educated at Dickinson College and the University of Pittsburgh School of Law. He manages the litigation practice at Cook, Sladoje & Wittenberg Co., L.P.A. He is the author 18 published books on the Civil War, and has worn several awards for his work. His specialty is cavalry operations with a particular emphasis on mounted operations in the Gettysburg Campaign. He frequently works with the Civil War Trust on various preservation projects, was a member of the Governor of Ohio's Advisory Commission on the Sesquicentennial of the Civil War, and is a past president of the Central Ohio Civil War Roundtable. He, his wife Susan, and their three golden retrievers live in Columbus, Ohio. +

### Fighting the Civil War: Historical Treasures of the Conflict in the Collection of the National Civil War Museum

**O**peneed in 2001, The National Civil War Museum in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania is one of the largest museum in the country dedicated to telling the complete story of the war from the viewpoint of both sides. The museum holds more than 4,000 three dimensional artifacts and over 21,000 archival items including manuscripts, diaries, letters, photographic images, newspapers, and correspondence dating from 1861-1865. Join the museum's CEO Wayne Motts on a journey of the history of the war illustrated by some of the nations' rarest surviving Civil War artifacts in the museum's collection.

**W**ayne E. Motts holds two degrees in history and has been a licensed battlefield guide at the Gettysburg National Military Park for twenty-eight years. In 2005 he was named executive director of the Adams County Historical Society located in Gettysburg, a position he held for seven years. He is currently the CEO of The National Civil War Museum ([www.nationalcivilwarmuseum.org](http://www.nationalcivilwarmuseum.org)) in Harrisburg, PA. He is the co-author (with James Hessler) of Pickett's Charge at Gettysburg: A Guide to the Most Famous Attack in American History. He is a life member of the Gettysburg Civil War Roundtable. +



**The Gettysburg/Appomattox Centennial Student Exchange Program** – Classes from Gettysburg and Appomattox VA participate in this student exchange program, visiting and taking part





## THE TAMMANY REGIMENT: A History of the Forty-Second New York Volunteer Infantry

**1861-1864** by Fred C. Wexler

This book was just published after more than 20 years of research. As the Union mobilized to meet the military challenges of the Civil War, the people of New York volunteered in large numbers to meet the quotas set by President Lincoln. Tammany Hall used all of its political power to recruit men, mostly Irish immigrants, to form the regiment that would bear its name throughout most of the fiercest fighting of the war—from the bluffs outside Leesburg, the West Woods of Antietam, and the streets of Fredericksburg. The Tammany Regiment, commanded by Colonel James Mallon, fought at Gettysburg on July 2-3 in several separate actions, most notably at the conclusion of Pickett's Charge at the Copse of Trees, and on to the chaos that was Petersburg. Of the more than one thousand men who started with the regiment in 1861, less than one hundred would remain in 1864.
